EXPANSION & RECRUITMENT

Once vacant buildings are seeing new life as a result of aggressive business recruitment, retention, and expansion efforts. Continued enhancements to our economic development marketing strategy resulted in a pipeline of **111 new leads**, **101 new projects** and the creation of **341 new jobs** announced to date creating a growth of **\$20.2 million** in local annual payroll, **\$107.5 million** in new commercial building permits and **\$33 million** invested in new Greater Hutch projects.

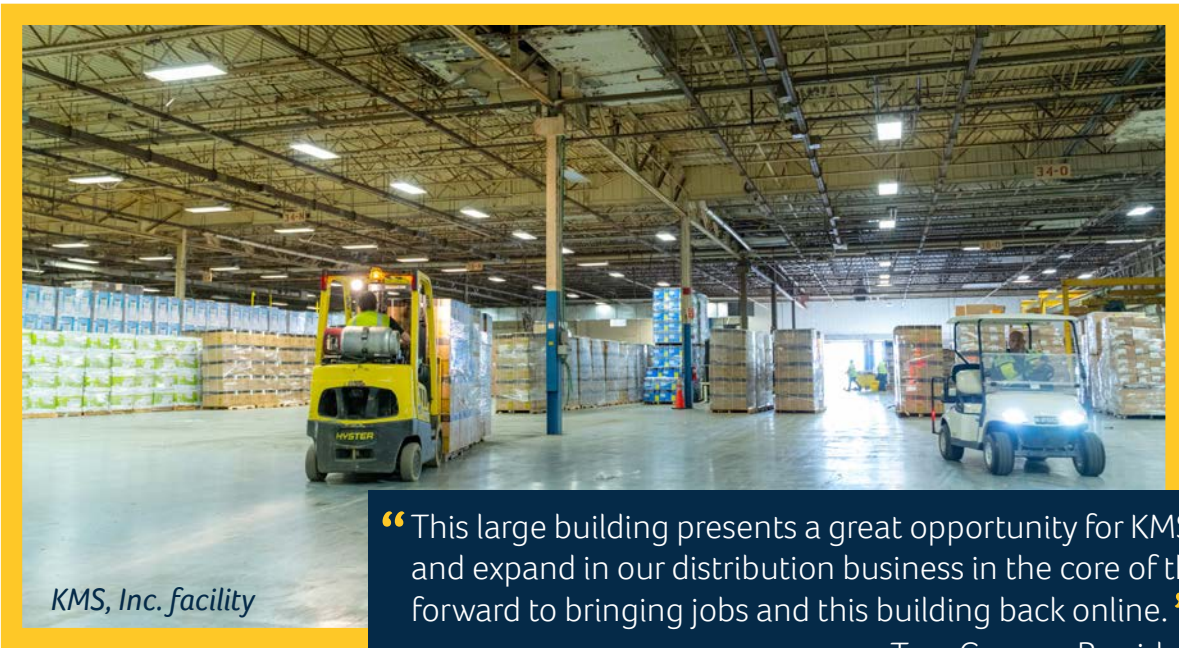

INDUSTRY GROWTH STRATEGIES

In 2017, Greater Hutch embarked on a targeted industry analysis to refine our marketing strategy. We evaluated a broad set of factors and trends to identify target industries for future economic development activities. This included analysis of industry clusters, local interviews, and economic research, which has guided our marketing to specific site selection experts and trade groups. The local targets identified included major categories of advanced manufacturing, healthcare, technology, retail

and destination tourism, and entrepreneurship. Specific sub-sectors were then identified within each target to include natural strengths of Reno County - food processing, value-added ag and equipment manufacturing, warehousing and distribution, aerospace, technology, customer service, and specialty healthcare services. A retail gap analysis was conducted in order to attract specialty retail to complement our existing regional trade pull area.

To leverage the agricultural assets, as a platform for new business attraction and development, Greater Hutch convened industry groups to engage the existing business community in growth strategies, including industry round tables and workforce symposiums. Working in conjunction with the Kansas Department of Agriculture's Ag Marketing division, Greater Hutch convened a Reno County Ag-Promotion Task Force to establish focused priorities for agricultural related business development across Reno County, building on the strengths of our existing ag sector.



REGIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

Reno County is part of a ten county regional marketing partnership led by the Greater Wichita Partnership. Through this regional partnership, as well as, our investment in Team Kansas, and the renewed, aggressive recruitment approach at the Kansas Department of Commerce, we have seen a significant increase in requests for proposals for large sites and buildings within these target areas.

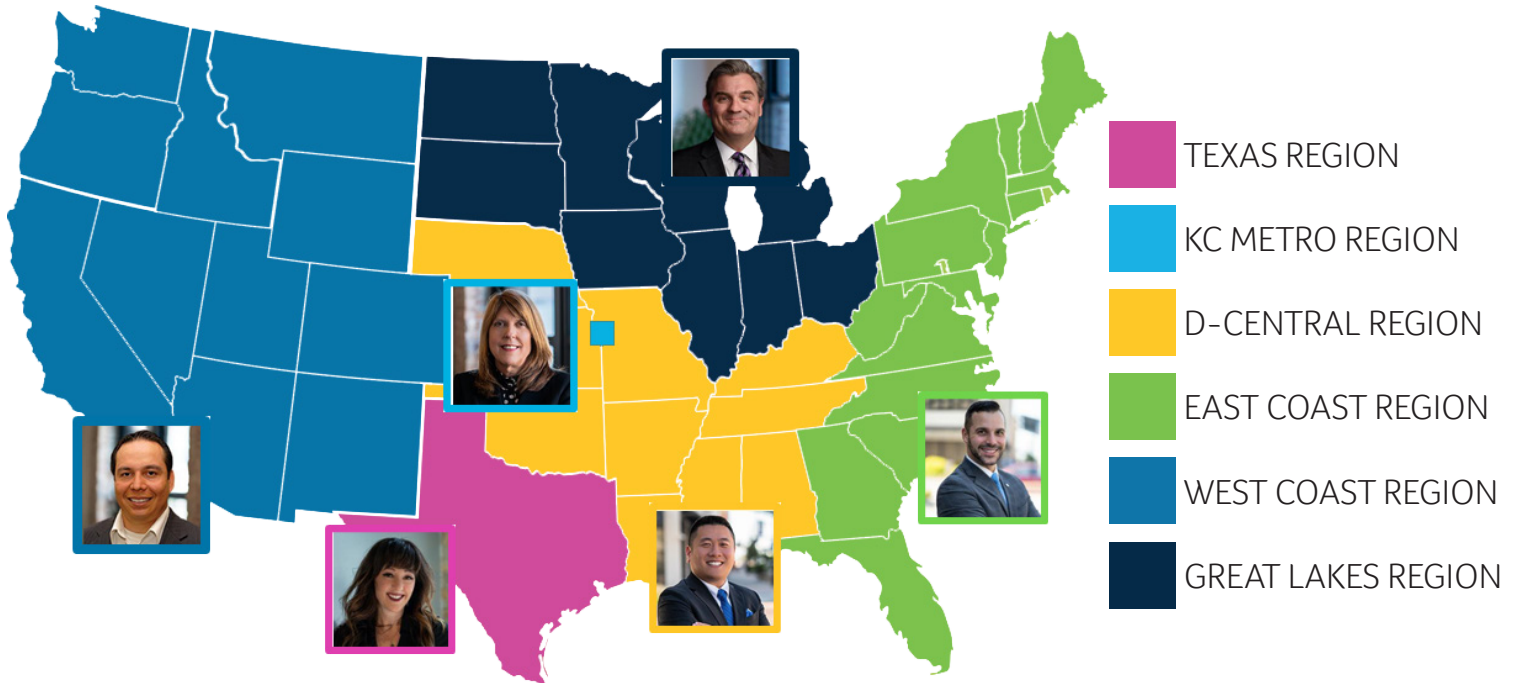

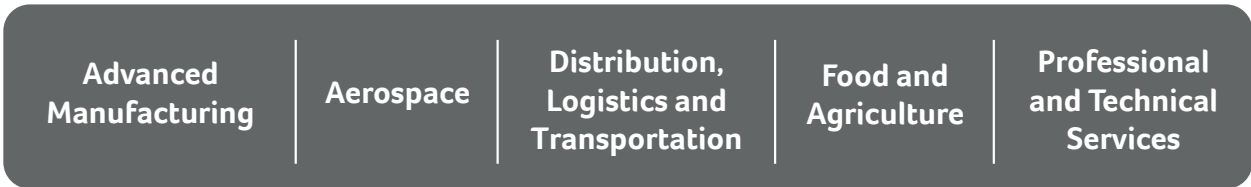

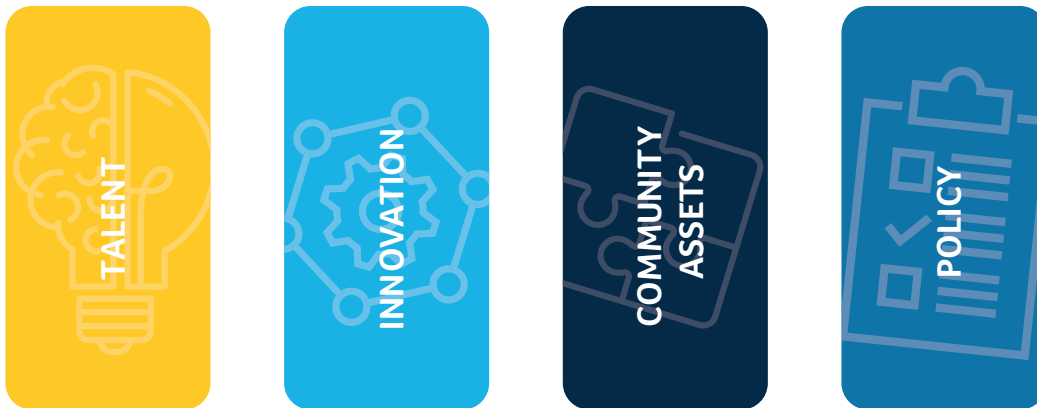
FRAMEWORK FOR GROWTH

The Kansas Department of Commerce is the lead agency for economic development in Kansas. In 2020, under the leadership of Governor Laura Kelly and Lieutenant Governor and Commerce Secretary David Toland, and in partnership with communities, businesses, academia and economic development partners across the state, Kansas released a comprehensive economic development strategy called the Framework for Growth.

WORKFORCE INITIATIVES

Developing the workforce of tomorrow is critical to the economic vitality of our businesses and region. In order for a company to succeed, it must have the skilled and ambitious talent to propel it forward. Throughout the last five years, we have increased collaboration with community business, industry, and education partners to develop new strategies and initiatives to grow the talent pipeline.



MANUFACTURING DAY SCHOOL TOURS

In efforts to connect our educational partners with area manufacturers, Greater Hutch coordinated Business and Industry Tours where teachers toured several of our local manufacturing facilities, allowing them to see first hand the types of skilled jobs available and giving them the opportunity to pass that information on to their students.



INTERN HUTCH

The Intern Hutch program, coordinated by Greater Hutch, in cooperation with Young Professionals of Reno County, helps to engage interns in the great quality of life Reno County has to offer. By encouraging their participation in an array of activities ranging from social events to professional development opportunities, interns are able to envision their future in Reno County.



PROMOTING EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

In 2019, Greater Hutch launched a Job Portal on GreaterHutch.com, providing employers with another avenue to promote available positions. In addition, Greater Hutch coordinated industry participation at statewide and area career fairs to help businesses connect with students about the job opportunities available in Reno County.

DEVELOPING A TALENT PIPELINE

In response to the needs of local industry to grow the talent pipeline in Reno County, Greater Hutch has collaborated with Hutchinson Community College and Hutchinson Career and Technical Education Academy to launch two new workforce development programs that enhance technical educational training opportunities for our local youth.

CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION SIGNING DAY

The inaugural Sign Day event held at the Hutchinson Career and Technical Education Academy brought students from fourteen area school districts and private schools to honor students who are entering a technical field and emphasize the importance of their career choice. Students, along with their family, school staff and administration, and industry partners were invited to celebrate as the students joined their peers in committing to their future technical program pathway of choice. This event was made possible with support from a number of area businesses and our education partners.

FUTURE APPRENTICESHIP SUCCESS TRAINING PROGRAM

The F.A.S.T. Track Program, Future Apprenticeship Success Training, with funding support from Greater Hutch and area industries, is a newly created Manufacturing Skills Boot Camp for area graduating seniors in Reno, McPherson, and Harvey counties offered at Hutchinson Community College. The program is designed to give young adults in the area an opportunity to learn basic manufacturing and industry skills and expectations of area employers. Along with on-site tours of area manufacturers, the boot camp includes classroom and lab training with topics such as applied math, blueprint reading, precision measurement, OSHA 10 safety and work ethics.

TALENT RECRUITMENT

In 2017 Greater Hutch launched a Backstage Pass program as a way to support the talent recruitment efforts of area businesses. This program engages local partners, as well as Greater Hutch volunteers and staff to provide tours to key recruitment prospects who are interviewing for positions in Reno County. Typically a community tour highlights our amazing quality of life amenities - schools, neighborhoods, parks, arts and recreation, outdoor life, and retail offerings to help show prospects a behind the scenes “backstage” experience about life in Reno County.

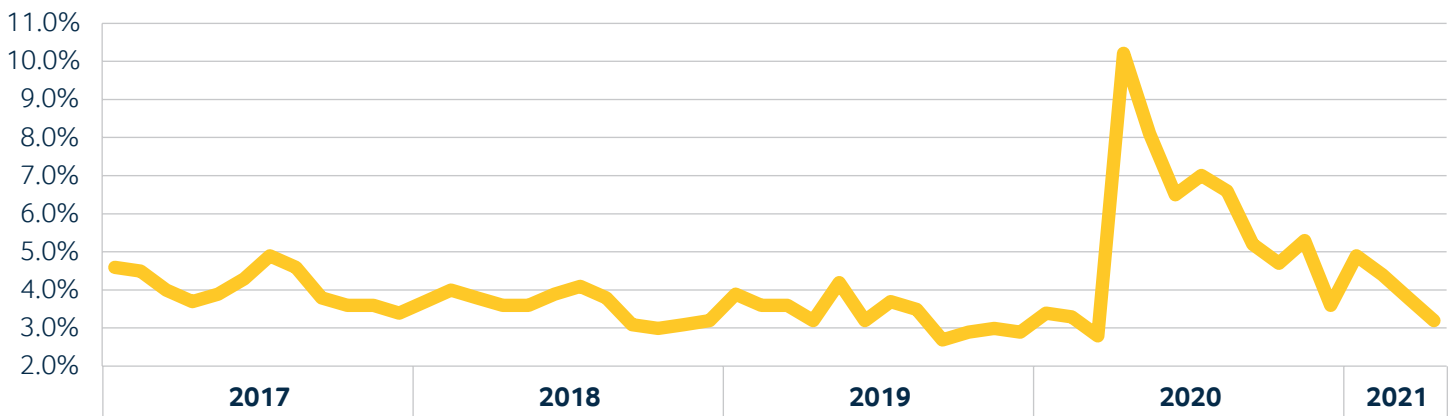

Employment estimates released by the Kansas Department of Labor in May 2021 showed an estimated 28,667 people employed in the county, up more than 400 people from March 2021 and 1,079 more than April 2020. The county's unemployment rate of 3.2 percent for April 2021 compared to 3.8 percent in March and 10.2 percent in April 2020. The last time it was lower was in March 2020, when it dipped to 2.8 percent.

STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS

Local partnerships play an important role in the delivery of workforce and economic development activities. With these partnerships, Greater Hutch has served as a hub for collaboration and communications between the public and private sectors addressing community capacity building issues such as housing, healthy neighborhoods, workforce readiness and infrastructure including broadband and internet connectivity in the rural areas of Reno County.



HEALTHY NEIGHBORHOODS

The Hutchinson Healthy Neighborhoods Initiative is a collaborate approach to improve the livability of area neighborhoods, with the overarching goal of ensuring that Hutchinson is an attractive place to live, work, play, and raise a family. Since 2017 Greater Hutch has directly provided \$80,000 to Hutch Rec to support the healthy neighborhoods initiative, in addition to direct funding support from the City of Hutchinson and the Hutchinson Community Foundation in matching funds.



BOYS & GIRLS CLUBS OF HUTCHINSON

In 2020, Greater Hutch collaborated with the Boys and Girls Clubs of Hutchinson to establish a new teen program called The Mine that focuses on workforce readiness including employability skills, career exploration, and personal branding. In 2021, Greater Hutch, in cooperation with the HCF, provide a three year grant commitment of \$10,000 per year to support a workforce coordinator position to further develop programming for the Epic Skillz program.

EXPANDING RURAL BROADBAND IN RENO COUNTY

With grant funding provided by the Kansas Department of Commerce, along with community partnerships with Greater Hutch, the Reno County Commission, Hutchinson Community Foundation, and United Way of Reno County, IdeaTek was able to complete a monumental project of delivering gigabit fiber and ultra-high-speed internet to under-served premises throughout central and southwestern Kansas. Fiber optic internet was installed to over 4,200 households and businesses, as well as 70 wireless towers were constructed and upgraded to bring ultra-fast, unmetered wireless internet to over 6,100 locations. In 2020, Greater Hutch provided a one-time, \$30,000 grant to support the Reno County rural service area.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP

In 2017, conversations began about creating a more comprehensive entrepreneurial ecosystem. A total of 19 organizations across Reno County began conversations to assess the entrepreneurship ecosystem. Several meetings including a town hall event helped create and inspire the vision for what is now known as StartUp Hutch, built on the foundation of success of the Quest Center for Entrepreneurship. This diverse group came together with the vision of providing an inclusive local ecosystem that inspires and supports innovators for a thriving economy. Greater Hutch and StartUp Hutch have worked hand in hand to create connections between existing businesses and budding entrepreneurs, and have partnered on several new business opportunities with resource and loan programs creating new vitality across Reno county.

DEVELOPING DESTINATION RETAIL

In 2017, Greater Hutch contracted with Catalyst Commercial to develop a plan that would help fill strategic gaps in destination retail. A retail promotion prospectus was developed to capitalize on our recent strengths with a focus on addressing retail gaps and leakage.

CATALYST RECOMMENDATIONS & EMERGING TARGETS

- Capture visitor thru put to capitalize on existing tourists
- Enhance national retail concepts to capture the retail trade area and mitigate leakage to larger cities
- Carry out the comprehensive plan for improvements to entrances and commercial corridors
- Develop a program to curate and grow retail and restaurants with a focus on critical mass in downtown
- Improve retail district walkability, signage, and pedestrian experience
- Leverage a health and wellness strategy to attract young professionals and active adults
- Strengthen mixed uses in downtown and commercial districts with attention to arts and events, housing, and creating a feel of urban vibrancy

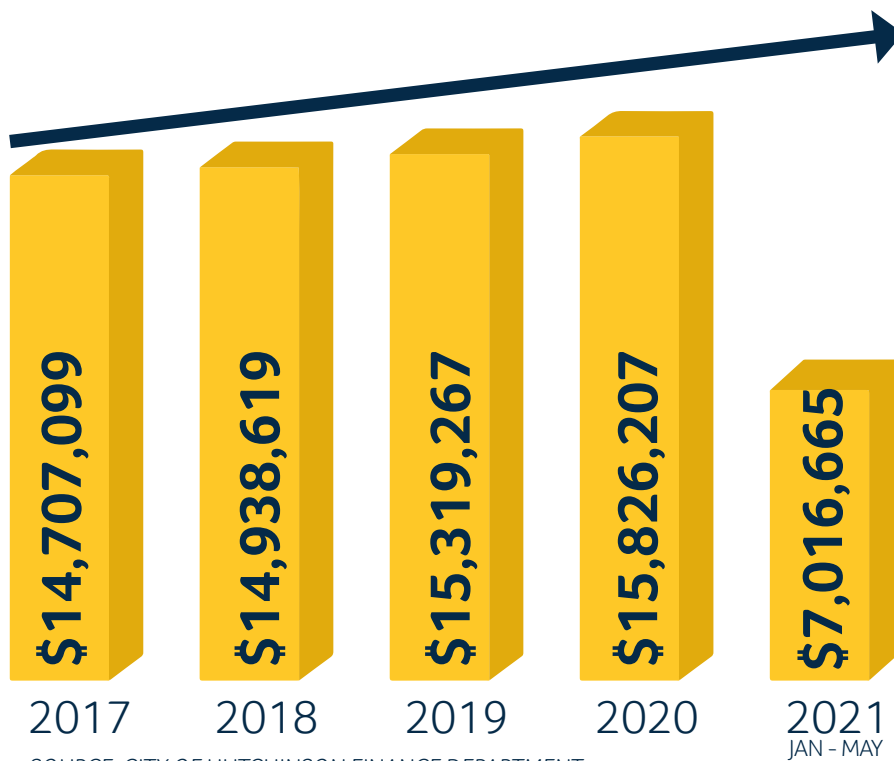

Sales tax receipts continue at a record pace for both Hutchinson & Reno County in 2021. In Hutchinson, May 2021 receipts, collected on March sales, eclipsed last year's totals by nearly 22 percent and shattered the previous May record set in 2018 by more than 13 percent. In the county, receipts were up about 16.5 percent over last year and about 4.5 percent over the county's previous May record, set in 2015.

KANSAS MAIN STREET INCENTIVE WITHOUT WALLS LOAN FUND

The Incentive Without Walls Revolving Loan Fund was established in coordination with the Kansas Main Street program as a way to create and stimulate private investment in the downtown area. Since 2019, the Hutch Chamber has been managing a portfolio of \$200,000 and 19 outstanding loans. As these funds are repaid, we are able to continue supporting entrepreneurs on Main Street. In 2020, a total of \$55,000 was loaned to seven downtown businesses.



COMMERCIAL REVITALIZATION

Greater Hutch embraces revitalization of existing buildings as a responsible reuse aspect of our development strategy. Our downtown in the last decade began a period of redevelopment. In the last five years over 40 new businesses located in Downtown Hutch, more space was activated in the Uptown Hutch Mall, and other commercial corridors began seeing new life. The adaptive reuse and reactivation of space in the Mall defies nationwide trends where some malls are being vacated, a result of online competition and changing brick and mortar strategies. Hutchinson has always been a regional trade center, and each of these commercial corridors serve an important role in creating community pride.

A deliberate effort to create live/work/play districts, where mixed used developments including office, professional services, retail, healthcare, and restaurants, combined with upper floor living, bring foot traffic back which then improves the overall vibrancy of a community. Development experts point to renaissance of downtowns as one of the key ingredients to creating the quality of place that people seek in choosing where to live. People choose places that feel vibrant, active, and unique. Executives who come for site visits almost always say “I want to see your downtown”. Young professionals choose a location first based on key attributes such as - community vibrancy, affordable housing, quality schools and healthcare, and recreation and arts. The revitalization which has occurred in many of commercial corridors helps us sell Reno County as a place to connect, grow, play, and explore.



LEVERAGING RESOURCES

Greater Hutch staff help local businesses and new prospects identify available resources to assist in a variety of projects from industrial to commercial and sole proprietorships. Greater Hutch partners with agencies including the Kansas Department of Commerce, Network Kansas, South Central Kansas Economic Development District, StartUp Hutch, Hutchinson Community Foundation, and other federal, state and local agencies to provide information about a variety of economic development tools. LOOKING AHEAD

Our economic development program of work will continue to focus on the four key economic development strategies:

- Business retention and expansion
- Business recruitment and attraction
- Enhanced community development capacity
- Workforce development

In the years ahead we have more work to do on key community development issues in order to continue the successful momentum created during the last decade.

Workforce Development & Talent Attraction - Workforce availability continues to impact businesses which makes grooming talent and attracting talent priority #1.

Housing - The two most recent employer surveys have identified housing as a key issue in talent recruitment. Continuing to address housing quality, affordability and quantity has become more important as inventory continues to sell quickly.

Childcare & Early Childhood - Childcare availability for infants and toddlers remains an issue needing community wide attention in order to maintain competitiveness in recruiting and retaining young families.

Product Development - Shovel ready sites and modern buildings for business development are extremely limited. Efforts will focus on the next phase of future large sites and speculative building development.

Revitalization - While progress has been made to re-purpose many existing buildings, there are still commercial spaces that have been impacted by changing consumer patterns, leaving vacancy in brick and mortar storefronts. A continued focus in redevelopment of existing buildings will remain a priority.

Competitive Resources - Working with public partners, a plan for more robust funds for discretionary project assistance is required in order to remain competitive.

We look forward to achieving these goals together and are fortunate to have the right team in place at this critical moment in time. Thank you for your continued investment and future support of Reno Rising and the work of the Greater Hutch Economic Development Partnership.

COVID-19 RESPONSE

While COVID-19 presented many challenges to our businesses, non-profit organizations, healthcare community and residents, the community rallied together and quickly implemented new programs and initiatives to respond to the issues created by the pandemic. Resource assistance and referrals were provided to help local businesses access many programs including the HIRE Fund, CDBG-CV program, SPARK funding, CARES Act funding, Economic Injury Disaster Loan, Payroll Protection Program, SCKEDD Disaster Relief Program, and American Rescue Plan.

RALLY RENO

Hutchinson Community Foundation, Hutchinson/Reno County Chamber, and United Way of Reno County teamed together to launch an online tool that allowed people to support their favorite retail, service, and hospitality businesses while also providing basic needs assistance to those affected by layoffs or reductions in pay.

In total, there were **2,556** gift certificates purchased to **95** participating businesses, which totaled **\$151,588** that was invested in our local small businesses that were affected by the COVID-19 crisis.



RENO COUNTY ECONOMIC RECOVERY TASK FORCE

In partnership with Reno County, we formed the Reno County Economic Recovery Task Force (RCERT), which engaged over **380** businesses throughout Reno County and created a steering committee to guide the reopening process and provide feedback to the Reno County Health Department. In total, **44** RCERT meetings were held. In addition, a COVID-19 webpage was developed with links to resources and programs resulting in over **6,500** page visits.
